



The Grant County Amateur Radio Club (GCARC) will be joining with the Blackford County Amateur Radio Club (BARC) to work Field Day 2017 from 2pm on June 24th until 2pm on June 25th at the soccer complex by Blackford High School. Lots of 'hams' provide delicious atmosphere

Amateur radio enthusiasts gather to connect with others near and far over the airwayes

Static. Static... "Can you hear me, this is... " Static.

It's a hobby that has been described as one built on the thrill of the contact; that far off voice coming across the airwaves from the other side of the world.

Amateur radio enthusiasts say they are proud to be known as hams. And it was field day for a lot of hams this past weekend at the soccer complex next to Blackford High School. Members of the Blackford County Amateur Radio

Club (BARC) were joined by fellow amateur radio enthusiasts from both Grant and Delaware counties

With the use of emergency generators and the creation of temporary antennas – wires attached to the towering light poles and strung across the soccer field – ham radio operators were on site for a 24-hour stretch of time in an effort to make connections with other stations around the country and world.

There are several versions of the story behind how amateur radio operators became known as 'hams', some dating back to the early 1900s, but Jeff Marsee, Blackford club secretary, said he believed it was in the 1940s, when radio operators were accused of "hamming it up," by some local folk.

However it came to be, if one happens to be introduced to an amateur radio operator, it's a given you just met a ham.

The ARRL Field day is an annual event that is held throughout North America. Each June, more than

35,000 hams across the nation set up temporary transmitting stations in public places to demonstrate ham radio's science, skill and service to communities and the nation.

When one is introduced to a ham, not only will you be told that person's name, but also their call name. In the ham world, that is their unique identification, one provided by the Federal Communications. Commission (FCC) upon licensing, which is required.

Marsee, who operates under the call name of KD9CQQ, noted that amateur radio is not just a hobby. Ham radio operators are often called up to assist in storm spotting, weather reporting and with emergency communications.

Wayne Williamson, whose call name

is KC9QCJ, noted that ham radio operators kept communications alive during the Earthquake in Haite. Ham radio operators were there during Hurricane Katrina, which hit the Gulf Coast of the US in August 2005 and was one of the five deadliest hurricanes in the history of the United States. Hams were also there during the wild fires out west.

In the emergency management world, when a disaster strikes, ham radios are pivotal to survival. Operators become community lifelines, with hams talking to each other and working with first responders to relay local conditions.

"We're prepared when no one else is," noted Chad Sullivan, also known as

He noted that there were many forms

of communication in the radio world.. voice, morse code (CW), digital mode and taletyme

Williamson said the local ham operators are not so much into digital communications, however, noting most of the local hams operate on analog systems.

Hams are regulated through the FCC.
"All of us are FCC licensed," Williamson
said. "You have to be to be able to be on

the airwaves."

He added that there were quite a few regulations that hams had to follow while on the airwaves.

A person will never hear a ham radio operator curse while on air.

FCC is the only agency to provide call numbers for a ham radio operator. When a person dies, their call name becomes

known as 'silent keys.'

Loren Rinker, also known as KD9GWL, said that a person can request the call name of a silent key. The request is often made due to a personal relationship with the person who died, such as a family member.

He said he was a radio operator while serving in Victnam, and that he has been involved as a ham ever since.

He said one of the goals of the ARRL Field Day was to hopefully recruit new members. The Blackford group meets at 7 p.m. the third Thursday of each month at the City Building in Hartford City, located at 700 N. Walnut St.

Anyone interested in learning more about becoming a ham, is welcome.




